THE NORWICH MILITARY ACADEMY

During the course of the American Civil War, 930 West Pointers served in the Union Armies. Surprisingly, Norwich provided 750 men to the Union. At least 56 Norwich alumni fought for the Confederacy. Among Norwich's alumni stood Major Generals Robert H. Milroy, Grenville Dodge, William "Bull" Nelson, Horatio G. Wright, "Fighting Joe" Mower Alfred H. Terry and Truman Seymour. They served in units such as the Iron Brigade and the Second Corps famous "Harvard Regiment," the 20th Massachusetts. Thomas Bragg, Braxton's brother, served as the Attorney General of the Confederacy for a time. Colonel Andrew J. Dorn commanded a regiment of Indians who fought for the Confederacy. Major General Ernest A. Harmon served as a distinguished armor officer during WWII. His commands included the 1st and 2nd Armored Divisions and the XXII Corps. After retiring in 1948, Harmon became President of Norwich University where spent two years as a student prior to going to West Point. He wrote of Norwich University:

Norwich, located in Northfield, Vermont, is a military college with an ancient and honorable history. Captain Alden Partridge, the founder, had the idea of preparing young Americans for the twofold function of the citizen soldier. In times of peace, they would serve as engineers and surveyors, businessmen and teachers. In times of war, they were prepared to serve their country as soldiers in the function of command. And so they did serve – in the Mexican War and in every war since. General Grenville Dodge, the engineer who built the first transcontinental railroad, was a Norwich alumnus. Admiral Dewey, the hero of Manila bay was a student there.

Norwich University was founded in 1819 by Alden Partridge as the American Literary, Scientific and Military Academy. Fifteen years later it became known as Norwich University. It was the first private educational institution in the U. S. to be run in a military manner and served as the model for many other private military academies and is regarded as the birthplace of the ROTC concept.

In addition to General Dodge, other prominent Civil War leaders who attended Norwich included, Major Generals Robert Milroy, William "Bull" Nelson, Truman Seymour, Alfred H. Terry and Secretary of the Navy Gideon Welles. Four alumni were awarded the Medal of Honor. The school also produced a number of Confederate officers as well. Until now, the importance of Norwich University as a training ground for future Union officers has been little appreciated.

Preservation Corner No News is Good News in Centreville
