American Sevastopol: George McClellan and Federal Defeat at Yorktown

Where: Centreville Public Library When: July 13th, 2000, 7:30 pm

In the fall of 1861, most of those who knew George McClellan considered him a genius, or at least a brilliant young man of great promise. A year later, many saw him for what he was — an intelligent, charismatic, immature and emotionally unstable humbug.

Whatever merits McClellan had as an administrator were largely negated by his shortcomings as a strategist and field commander. His grand schemes for Federal victory were naively optimistic, and not surprisingly, he found himself unable to execute them. The failure of his Peninsula Campaign in the spring and summer of 1862 marked a turning point in the course of the war, and that defeat owed much to the Young Napoleon's confused and ineffectual performance at Yorktown in April 1862. Though he later claimed it as a victory and one of the greatest accomplishments of his career, Yorktown was patently a defeat, and a major setback for Federal fortunes. We will examine what happened at Yorktown and why. We will look at McClellan's options and his decisions, discuss his conduct of the siege and consider his explanations - or excuses -- for the many delays that later proved so costly to the campaign, his career and the Union cause.

And we will see that when McClellan came to write his report two years later, he deftly manipulated facts and the statements of others to support his






