

### ANTIETAM NATIONAL BATTLEFIELD UNVEILS PROTOTYPE OF CIVIL WAR SOLDIERS DATA BASE



Visitors will be able to gain access to *limited* Civil War data by operating the keyboard of the computer. The computer currently includes information on burial records at Antietam, some monuments at Antietam, and a very small number of soldiers and regiments who fought at other Civil War battles.

The park is just beginning to test the system and encourages visitors using the computer to offer suggestions for improvements or changes. The ultimate goal of establishing a list of all soldiers who fought in the Civil War is still at least several years from completion.

The great Valley of Virginia was before us in all its beauty," wrote one Louisianian. "Fields of wheat spread far and wide, interspersed with woodlands, bright in their robes of tender green. Wherever appropriate sites existed, quaint old mills, with turning wheels, were busily grinding the previous year's harvest; and grove and eminence showed comfortable homesteads. The soft vernal influence shed a languid grace over the scene." The idyllic Valley was a place so fertile, so temperate and so fair that possession of it had for generations driven men to war. Indians had long fought over the territory, and continued fighting with the whites almost into the 19th century. In the 1860s, the people of the tranquil Valley were to learn that the same natural attributes of the landscape that attract peaceful, industrious, lovers of splendor also attract agents of destruction. The bottom lands of river valleys, so precious and productive for farmers, become commissaries to nations at war. Wide, glassy rivers, their clear waters full of fish, become barriers to protect legions from their enemies and the wooded slopes of mountains, so pleasing to the eye and spirit, become commanding fortresses and spy towers. So it has always been, and so it would be in the spring of 1862 and the summer and autumn of 1864.

Because the significant political barriers of the Civil War ran generally east-west, dividing territory into north and south, the natural barriers of the Shenandoah Valley — the Allegheny Mountains on the west and the Blue Ridge on the east — formed a natural corridor that crossed the political boundaries between Virginia and the North. The northern end of the Valley at Harpers Ferry yawned invitingly at the very doorstep of the North, scant miles from Pennsylvania and considerably north of Washington. An aggressive Confederate commander in the Valley could use the mountains to shield his advance, cross the Potomac River into Maryland and threaten Washington from the north.

The key to the Valley was Winchester. Served by both the railroad and a network of excellent roads, including the surfaced Valley Turnpike, Winchester was an ideal supply and staging area, both for invading the North and for driving southward deep into the Valley. The town changed hands scores of times during the war, and Northerners and Southerners alike erected earthen forts on the surrounding hills in efforts to hold the historic old town. Armies under Jackson, Ewell, Banks, Milroy, Early and Sheridan clashed at Winchester, fighting three pitched battles in three different campaigns and countless skirmishes in and around the town.
