The Civil War Santa, Kevin Rawlings, visits our round table this month. This will be a fun evening filled with tales of what the soldiers did to celebrate the holidays.

Mock dress parades usually came on holidays as part of extensive programs featuring sports, horse races, competitive firing, feasting, drinking and other activities...Frequently at Christmastime and on St. Patrick's Day, regimental streets and quarters were elaborately decoracted with evergreen wreaths, arches and other appropriate ornaments.

In shooting matches, foot races, hurdles, sack races and wheelbarrow races, representatives of companies usually competed for cash prizes of one to five dllars. Chasing greased pigs or climbing slick poles at the top of which were nailed five-dollar bills were ordinarily free-for-all affairs, with the porker or money going to the first successful contestant... Whisky flowed freely on these occasions, adding to the festivity and producing on the morrow a heavy crop of hang-overs.

If you have not paid your 1998 dues, I strongly urge you to do so; otherwise, your membership expires December 31.



### The Green Green Grass of Home

uring our rescheduled Centreville to Union Mills tour of Oct. 25, we visited the old Centreville Methodist Church, also known as the Stone Church. This building is now the Anglican Catholic Church of the Ascension. Senior Warden Thomas Pollard, a retired Army officer, graciously led us on an informative tour of the church and its grounds. At that time, he mentioned that the priests and members of another parish, St. Columba in Lebanon, Va., also had a great interest in our War of Secession.

On Nov. 25, *The Washington Times* carried an Associated Press article corroborating Mr. Pollard's comments. According to the article, Rev. Francis Blair celebrated a requiem Mass at St. Columba Church on Nov. 22 for five Confederate soldiers whose remains were recently returned from the prisoner o war cemetery at Fort Delaware,

Delaware. All five had enlisted in the Confederate army at Abingdon, Virginia and were POWs when they died at Fort Delaware. During the Mass, Rev. Blair said, "This is not a reenactment. This is the first and only funeral these men will receive."

Some time ago, Bill Milhorn of Bristol, Va., discovered a letter from a Confederate POW at Fort Delaware to his family. Private Eli D. Anderson of Lee County, Va. Advised his family he probably would not survive the amputation of his gangrenous leg and asked them to bring his body home rather than let it remain buried in Yankee soil. Mr. Milhorn met with Rev. Strother Smith of St. Columba, and soon plans to bring the remains of Private Anderson home were made. He was laid to rest at the newly consecrated St. Columba cemetery on May 26, 1997. The five warriors in gray joined him. Requiescat in Pace.

# GETTYSBURG ON REMEMBRANCE DAY

On a cold and cloudy day, the Remembrance Day Parade made its way through the streets of Gettysburg on Nov. 11. As we waited to form up, the familiar commanders such as Lee, Jackson, Longstreet and Heth could be seen organizing the columns getting ready to march. The Confederate column started to take shape, and we watched and waited as the Federal troops marched up the road with banners flying. What a glorious sight!

My position in the Confederate column was with the color guard, the second line of the column. When the end of the Federal column pass by, the order to march was sounded and the Confederates started, with our banners flying. And I could see the bayonets shining, even though it was a cloudy day. The fifes and drums played all the songs of Dixie, and crowds cheered all along the street up to the Cyclorama. Flowers were thrown to the troops. This was my first Remembrance Day parade and I was honored to represent Gen. Longstreet on such a special day.

The parade ended at the Cyclorama and was followed by a ceremonial shaking of hands across the wall at the angle. As this got underway I went to another ceremony, given by Brian Pohanka and the Fifth New York at Little Round Top, an annual tribute which this regiment gives to honor G.K. Warren at his statue. I was the only Confederate present, and felt truly honored. Mr. Pohanka gave a very moving speech and I must thank him for acknowledging Longstreet's contributions to the battle and the war. It meant a lot to me to represent General Longstreet, and to have been invited to participate in the Fifth New York's ceremony.

I'd also like to thank Gen. Harry Heth (aka Mac Butler) for getting me in the show! What a great organizer he is. Thanks also to the Homestead for giving us a warm place to stop by and get out of the cold. I'll be back next year.

# DEDICATION The Monument at Longstreet's Birthplace

Jan. 10 North Augusta, S.C.

As many of you know, our roundtable's vice president, Dan Paterson, is Gen. James Longstreet's great grandson. Consequently, he's active in promoting the memory of this great soldier.
